The story of Pacifique, his wife Francine, and their four young girls is a wonderful example.

The two parents were recent refugees from the Congo and resettled in Madison last year after spending years in a refugee camp in Burundi. Upon deciding to visit Dale Heights Presbyterian Church in their new neighborhood, they found more than a church home. The family was connected with a Swahili-speaking church, job opportunities, new friends, and even a school for their girls through friends at Christ Presbyterian Church, Lighthouse Church, Jewish Social Services, and Temple Beth El.

# You provide connection around local justice issues

Seven Affinity Groups, meetings made up of pastors, lay leaders, non-profit members and community members, provided space to share best practices, encouragement, prayer, and collaborative efforts around specific issues in our community. Our current groups focus on **school partnerships**, **human trafficking**, **and immigration**. Out of the connections made at the school partnership affinity group, we organized and hosted the <u>Collaborative Food Drive</u> with 6 local churches. Together they collected, boxed, and delivered over 2,000 lbs of food to local school food pantries.

## You give local pastors rest and renewal

In February, we hosted our first Rest and Renewal retreat with pastors from six different churches. It was a gift to have time away to connect with God and each other. We look forward to providing space for local pastors to experience community and contemplation in the year ahead.

# You make collaboration between churches possible

In March, people from over 50 churches gathered at the 6th annual Kingdom Justice Summit to better engage with schools, fight human trafficking, and love our immigrant community. In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, we had the opportunity to further several creative collaborations, from the \$300,000+ raised for the Psalm 46 Relief Fund to 16 churches represented in the United Prayer days, or connecting local churches to provide a \$10,000 match for Morgan's lemonade stand which to date has raised nearly \$60,000 to provide meals for kids in Dane County.




